Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Division to encourage OSH employees to expand their construction expertise. Employees must complete a minimum of six modules, have completed all of the OSH core courses and be a career state employee at the time of completion. Summer, Summer, Summer Time

It's officially summer 2017! A favorite season for a lot of us...longer days, trips to the beach, cookouts, vacation, school's out, and there's less traffic. Time to sit back and unwind. Well, almost. The beginning of summer also marks the ending of the current performance cycle and a time to reflect on the results of your own performance. Woo-hoo!

Actually, annual performance evaluation time is not so bad when you think about it in terms of being able to minimize the inevitable stress that accompanies this time of year. And how do we do that? We put together a few strategies to help alleviate the small amount of stress that we may get while having to do self-evaluations and in anticipating the appraisal meeting with our supervisors.

Reflect, Prepare, Gather

If you have had interval performance review meetings throughout the current performance cycle, you have a head start. Consider the discussions and feedback (positive and constructive) that you had with your direct supervisor and any third party feedback and interactions, and include that information in your self-appraisal.

Don't be Shy

Pump up your accomplishments and, if applicable, document those extra miles that you journeyed in effort to do more than your best. Make a list of those things to communicate your value during your selfevaluation task and in the appraisal meeting discussion with your supervisor.

Making Lemonade

We often prepare for the appraisal meeting with apprehension while bracing ourselves to hear criticism. That's just what we do, but why not think about the things that we may receive criticism on and be ready to provide a non-defensive response. Or better yet, begin to improve in that area. There is no rule that says you cannot ask your supervisor what areas he or she feels that you can improve upon to help you with this.

Feedback is a Gift

Remember that getting feedback is a good thing and it promotes growth. Specific positive feedback keeps us motivated to do more of the same or better. Specific constructive feedback helps you improve and get to the next level. You definitely want to hear more than "you did a great job" at your appraisal meeting. You want to hear what it was that you did great and, also, what areas can be improved.

Now you can get started on your self-evaluation with confidence and the opportunity for a successful collaborative meeting with your supervisor. Annual performance evaluation time may never be your favorite summer time activity, but with the right mindset and preparation, the experience may be better than you expect.

State Health Plan Important Information

If you cover dependents on your State Health Plan, you will soon receive a letter in the mail from the State Health Plan notifying you of an upcoming audit. Even if you have provided this information in the past to HR or to e-Enroll, you must provide it again to the State Health Plan during this audit period in order for your dependents to maintain coverage.

The State Health Plan conducts these audits every few years in an effort to make sure that all covered dependents are eligible to be enrolled in the State Health Plan. You will need to follow the instructions in your letter and provide the required documentation to the State Health Plan by July 31, 2017, or your dependents will be dropped from the State Health Plan.
