From the Commissioner

Fair season is well underway across North Carolina. I can feel the excitement in the air as I make my way across the state visiting with North Carolina's smaller agricultural fairs.

The Elevator and Amusement Device Bureau has established voluntary partnerships with 23 fairs for the 2011 season. The partnerships promote safety on midways and aim to prevent careless accidents caused by ride operators, children and the general public.

During fair season, the department participates in three ride safety press conferences—the Mountain State Fair, the Dixie Classic Fair and the N.C. State Fair. The press conferences give us the opportunity to brief the media on the status of the amusement ride inspection process and answer any technical questions they might have. TV reporters will often go behind-the-scenes to cover the ride inspection process to share with viewers.

The Mountain State Fair press conference was held on Sept. 8 in Fletcher, and the Dixie Classic's took place on Friday, Sept. 30, in Winston-Salem. The N.C. State Fair safety press conference is scheduled for Thursday. Oct. 13

Fire Prevention Week: Protect your Family from Fire!

What's the best way to protect your family from fire? Be ahead of the game, of course. With more than 360,000 home fires reported in the United States in 2009, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), your best defense is a good offense.



Oct 9-15 is Fire Prevention Week. The NFPA campaign this year focuses on preventing the leading causes of home fires—cooking, heating and electrical equipment, as well as candles and smoking materials. Additionally, it urges people to protect their homes and families with life-saving technology and planning.

In 2009, 2,565 people died in home fires. Nearly all of these deaths could have been prevented by taking a few simple precautions like having working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan, keeping things that can burn away from the stove and always turning off space heaters before going to bed. Fire is a dangerous opponent, but by anticipating the hazards, you are much less likely to be one of the nearly 13,000 people injured in home fires each year.

Follow these tips for protecting your home and family from fire:

- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove or portable space heater.
- Have a 3-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Replace or repair damaged or loose electrical cords.
- If you smoke, smoke outside.
- Use deep, wide ashtrays on a sturdy table.
- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other
 areas where people may fall asleep.

People need to provide the best protection to keep their homes and families safe in the event of a fire. This can be achieved by developing an escape plan that you practice regularly and equipping homes with life-saving technologies like smoke alarms and home fire sprinklers.

The following tips will help keep your family safe if there is a fire in your home:

- Install smoke alarms inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home (including the basement).
- Interconnect all smoke alarms in the home so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Test smoke alarms at least monthly and replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond when tested.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to respond if the smoke alarm sounds.
- Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible
 ways out. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways
 out of each room, including windows and doors.
- If you are building or remodeling your home, consider installing home fire sprinklers.
