However, I am pleased that this year's meeting will be held entirely in person, which will add to the energy and excitement of the conference activities.

On Aug. 29, I sent a department-wide memo regarding the Flexible Work-at-Home (WAH) Policy. This new policy, effective Sept. 1, is part of my long-term efforts to enhance morale across the department and help retain our hard-working, experienced and qualified staff.
